From the desk of Carol Hinkle (HACC Director)

First of all, thank you to all who help with the 50th Anniversary Open House. The guests who came through our building learned so much about the Hanover Area Council of Churches. They were amazed at what we do here and our hope is that they will tell others of the ministries we offer to the community. If you could not attend our open house, we invite you to come on any Monday-Friday between 8AM – 1PM or call 717-633-6353 for a Saturday appointment and we will be happy to give you a tour. The Lord has blessed us with two facilities that have helped thousands of people in the greater Hanover Area and our greatest desire is to continue in our mission in service to our Lord. As with any human organization, there are times when additional help is needed to successfully operate a ministry. Some of our wonderful volunteers have gotten to a stage in life that it is necessary to give up some responsibilities altogether or at the very least back away from some. This unfortunately is happening too frequently in some our ministries. Our need in PAL is at critical mass. The solution is to find several people who can volunteer to complete part of each position. We need a couple of people on Saturdays from @4:30 to 6:30 to sort and put away Amish Market Donations. If several people would volunteer for one week a month to do this work that would make the work easier on everyone. We need PAL monitor on weekends, again several people on a Saturday or Sunday 10:30AM until 1PM would help a great deal. Our food donations are very plentiful right now. The requirements by the Central PA Food Bank have increased in the last several month that reporting is extensive. All donations from Second Harvest and Feeding America need to be weighed and logged individually help would (Continued'on page 2

I read an interesting book entitled *No Perfect People Allowed: Creating a Come as You Are Culture in the Church*, by John Burke (Zondervan, 2005).

Many people who go to church each Sunday and look good on the outside but are a mess on the inside mostly, I guess, because they don't feel free to be authentic and show their real selves. I'm not sure why that is, because church is like a hospital for sinners. When we are troubled, the only place we CAN go to work through our struggles is to God. Church helps us keep our focus on what is good and right and true; it is the place where we are healed as we are immersed in God's presence each week through hearing the word, receiving the Holy Sacrament and being among God's people.

No Perfect People Allowed. It's a good title for a very important idea. According to the author, the average un-churched American doesn't go to church because they think they don't measure-up to the unrealistic façade some of us project. The major barriers, he says, have to do with trust, truth, tolerance, brokenness, and aloneness. People wonder: Can I come with my questions? Can I come (Continued on page 2)

with my fears? Can I come with my disagreements? Can I come with my doubts? Can I come as I am?

The answer, of course, is YES! Join the rest of us with some of these same questions! Nobody is perfect except Jesus, of course. Therefore, imperfect people should feel (and be made to feel) right at home, along with the rest of us who struggle with a sometimes hostile world. The message of the Christian faith is that, for our imperfection, GRACE has been made radically available to ALL PEOPLE through Christ. Since that's the case, living in gratitude for God's gift of grace is simply a better way to live!

Spiritual authenticity is what the author suggests we lack. Spiritual authenticity requires us to be real, and it means that church members discard our artificial smiles, broken halos, the pretense of "having it all together" and to recognize that we all struggle with sin. Being authentic also means we develop and grow because nothing alive and real stays the same. Therefore, an authentic follower of Christ, means to become increasingly like Jesus and that simply can't happen without progress and growth.

And, this growth can be a life-changing experience! It happens when we are brave enough to stop acting like we're perfect. Go to worship just as you are, but go also willing to be open to how Jesus might change you. This kind of atmosphere was much like the life and ministry of Jesus in the first century and like that of the early church. Maybe that's why so many imperfect people came and were changed into faithful disciples.

Christian aren't perfect, just forgiven. What matters is that Jesus is perfect, the perfect Lamb of God, who died for our sins so we could be reconciled to God, our heavenly Father.

FROM OUR PAST to OUR PRESENT: Meals On Wheels

Our second "oldest children" is our Meals on Wheels. We began organizing in 1969 and had 125 volunteers in its first year. The first 4years of the ministry meals were purchased from the Victory Restaurant. In 1773 the kitchen at Homewood took over supplying the meals. We continued to obtain meals from Homewood until September of 2005 when Meals on Wheels started to be served out of our own PAL kitchen at no cost to recipients. IN 1974 MOWS expanded to 5days a week from its original Monday, Wednesday, Friday schedule. We have been blessed with so many fine and caring individuals who have volunteered for years to be runners and drivers for this ministry. They go the extra mile for those they serve. More than once our volunteers have been the means of rescue for a stricken recipient getting emergency help and family intervention for someone. The gentle smile, the friendly "how are you today?" many times is the only regular contact some of our recipients have with the outside world.



Dear Members of the Hanover Area Council of Churches,

I have been asked to share some memories about the Ministries of H.A.C.C. I arrived in Hanover as the pastor of the St.Paul's Lutheran Church, 1214 Broadway, Dec.1, 1988. Shortly after that arrival, I was asked by Broadway's representative, LaDonna Wintrode, to attend your Board Meeting. Sister Sandy Clark was the president.

I have vivid memories of that meeting because there were so many different kinds of work in the Name of Jesus happening with energy and strength. I remember that I asked a lot of questions to help me grasp what was obviously a very active positive ecumenical group.

At that time P.A.L. was very important for the community. Meals were served in our individual churches. Foods were stored in the basement of the parsonage of Grace United Church of Christ. Frozen foods were in the local lce Locker. Because Broadway was two miles from center square vans were provided to help get people to the meals. Some rode bikes, some walked. Conversations about buying a building down town were blossoming to better meet the needs of people.

The Clothing Bank was in the Sunday School area of the former St.Mark Lutheran Church, where Royal Farms is located now. As a volunteer, working there was very difficult because of limited space. However, lots of clothing was donated by congregations and the needs of people were met.

It wasn't too long until I became a co-chair of the Public Worship Committee. We not only provided worship services that go on to this day but we also had up to three hymn sings in a year. We celebrated Pentecost together. Rev. Bruce Bouchard and I co-chaired the first Baccalaureate Committee for graduating seniors. We provided a glorious event the Sunday after Easter at St, Joseph's, where Bell Choirs came to play music that was played in their home churches Easter morning.

The work of H.A.C.C. continued to blossom and grow throughout the decades. Faith at work was well know for its work, esp. providing homemade "quilts" and kits for our hospital when a baby died.

The C.R.O.P. Walk brought in thousands of dollars, some of which was shared locally and others all over the world. Then, we provided housing during cold weather. The P.A.L. tables would be removed and cots assembled, every day, so that no one would freeze to death. This eventually became a formal ministry with the purchase of the building next to the Center. Thanks to so many congregations and local businesses that building was transformed into the "Changing Lives Shelter". Local businesses helped with building supply donations. Ed Nace was such a leader in this construction. Furniture was donated by so many of our congregations.

Throughout these many years, leadership changed and when needs were recognized new committees were organized to respond to help those in need. So many different avenues of service have faithfully been created to be a blessing to those who have so many varying and different needs.

Member congregations have been so faithful in providing foods, clothing and donations to move this work along throughout the years. In the most recent years, partnering with Community Aide, developing Ruth's Harvest, just to mention a few, have propelled us into where our ministries have continued to meet the needs of so many.

I have often heard it said that there are 1,000 volunteers that are involved in the ministries that we share as the Council of Churches.

In closing, it is so humbling to realize just how many individuals, congregations, community groups, schools and others have been so devoted to this work...not because we are "good" people. Rather because we respond freely and openly to the Call of Jesus to do whatever we are able to do to provide God's love and care with so many around us. The Hanover Area Council of Churches truly is one of the main ways in which we are able to respond to the Mission of the Body of Christ.

It has been an honor and a privilege throughout these many years through St.Paul's Broadway and now Mt. Carmel to work side by side with all of you, always keeping an eye out for needs that have not been met even now and growing in grace and faith together. As the old saying goes, "We ain't what we were and we ain't what we're gonna.be".


