A letter from Carol Hinkle HACC Executive Director

Changing Lives Shelter News

The Changing Lives Shelter is open and remains on a limited capacity. The following guidelines are in place:

- 1. The Shelter office is in operation 22-hours a day, 7-days a week. The Shelter closes each day between 11am and 1pm. Potential Residents must have lived in the Greater Hanover Area for at least four to six months;
- 2. The Shelter is operating on a one-person per room basis, due to Covid-19. The Shelter has the capacity to hold six men, six woman and two families.
- 3. Residents are subjected to mandatory random drug and alcohol testing. The Shelter has implemented the temperature monitoring system to safeguard our Residents and Staff.
- 4. Volunteers are currently needed in the Shelter during the afternoon/evening from 1pm-5pm and 5pm-8pm.



The year 2020, forever known as the year of Covid-19, will be memorable to us all for many uncomfortable and sad reasons. But...HACC's ministry to recipients and volunteers of its Meals on Wheels program are especially blessed by nourishment to their bodies and to their souls and we consider this year in the Council's ministry to shut-ins as very special. This year, amidst declining volunteer numbers, we still fed **8,812** meals with the help of over **75** volunteers who contributed more than **2,530** hours of service to our Lord and fellow man. We made an effort to send a few "extras" as well – adult coloring books and markers, short bible passages, daily devotionals, seasonal cards and items to lift spirits. The volunteers were exceptionally committed.



For the past 5 months, three marvelously kind and generous young women on a mission with the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints have assisted PAL Lunch and the Clothing Bank. Their local church is located in New Oxford at 1170 Kohler Mill Rd, New Oxford, PA 17350.

Sister Sadie Gassaway, Sister Danee Bradshaw and Sister Halle Glazebrook arrived in September 2020 and began working at PAL lunch on Wednesdays and the Clothing Bank on Fridays. Under the guidance of Joan Potter, PAL – they learned the daily routine of packing and distributing lunches. They occasionally cooked, stocked the pantry and prepackaged take home kits. They are compassionate Christians, and hardworking and given the reduction of volunteers during COVID, we literally could not have done PAL without them.

On Fridays, at the Clothing Bank, Denise Bunty, head of volunteering for that section of HACC, taught them to sort, organize, and distribute clothes. The women enjoyed both ministries because of the wonderful chance to work personally with those in need.

Sister Sadie and Sister Danee departed last week to continue their ministry in other parts of the country. Sister Kassidy Graham has just joined Sister Halle and will be here for the next few months. Despite her short stay, she says she "can already feel the Spirit in helping others at the Council of Churches." The "amazing spirit of all the volunteers" inspires Sister Halle! As a parting gesture, the young woman videotaped the staff who discussed their individual job duties and how they are enriched by the work. Last March, 2020 COVID news of social distancing, mask wearing and closed businesses changed the way things operated the Changing Lives Shelter and everyday business. Despite our alterations to operating, we continue to serve our clients and our financial needs remain. Thus, **Hanover Cares**, our annual fundraiser on radio stations WHVR and WYCR will continue in 2021. Instead of being able to spend time on air with guest speakers and musicians for a Thursday and Friday close to Valentine's Day, we are going to be given the whole month of February to try to get our message out and be able to accept donations for that time. We will do some live Better Living spots and some pre recorded spots with radio personalities (and with the chance of broadcasting on both radio stations WHVR and WYCR.)

Our statistics and practices have changed drastically during COVID. Our sleeping rooms are setup for two individuals, so to be safe we only have one person to a room unless from the same household. Therefore, instead of housing 24 people we are now only housing 12 singles plus families. In addition, at the direction of the Executive Committee on behalf of the Board, we limit our reach to the general Hanover Area w/residency in this area. This gave us a total number of residents who stayed at Changing Lives of 119 men, 45 women and 17 children for a total of 3900 shelter nights. The average stay per resident is 33 nights.



"We were wrong"

WARD BREHM ONCE wrote, "They say that if God wants to get your attention, he will toss a little pebble into your life. If that doesn't work, he will throw a rock. As a last resort, he will heave a brick!"

Africa was definitely my brick. It rocked my world in ways I never anticipated. Seeing with my own eyes the devastation caused by extreme poverty, lack of access to clean water, the HIV and AIDS pandemic, and preventable diseases like malaria truly made me wonder how anyone could be as willfully blind as I was. I used to say, I went to Africa to help save Africa. Now I know God had the opposite in mind. He brought Africa into my life to save me.

Not long after that fateful trip, while running at White Rock Lake in Dallas, I sensed God say to me, "I want you to apologize to the community for the kind of church you have been." I instantly knew exactly what he meant. I don't know how I knew it. I just did.

The church took out a full-page ad in the Dallas Morning News. In large, bold letters in the center of the page it read, "WE WERE WRONG."

At the bottom of the page was our apology:

We followed trends when we should have followed Jesus. We told others how to live but did not listen ourselves. We live in a land of plenty, denying ourselves nothing, While ignoring our neighbors who actually have nothing. We sat on the sidelines while AIDS ravaged Africa. We were wrong; we're sorry. Please forgive us.

The only other thing printed on the page was our church name, phone number, and website. We offered no explanation beyond the words of our apology, because explanations at the point of apology always sound like excuses. We only wanted to speak the truth about our behavior and offer a sincere apology to those whom we had hurt.

Sadly, the church today is better known for its political stance than helping the poor, feeding the hungry, or helping to heal the hurting. Do we dare believe the church could be known for its love and compassion more than its rhetoric and judgments? That's one risk I am willing to take

In the years since our apology, Springcreek Church has become an entirely different church. Hundreds and hundreds of children now have sponsors. The Nyakach Valley of Kenya has networks of wells, pipes, and water kiosks to serve thousands who used to fetch water from polluted lakes and streams. Children no longer regularly fall ill to easily preventable diseases like they once did. Everything for them has changed, as has everything for us.


I sincerely believe God's work done in God's way will always be mutually transformational. We are as changed by the work we are doing as the people we intend to serve. Our investment in our friends overseas has profoundly enriched our church family. They have taught us so much about true wealth — to be rich in faith, hope, and love.

In addition, we are assured in Scripture that God always hears the widow and the orphan's prayer. I sometimes wonder about my own prayers, but I am supremely confident about theirs. So, every day, on the other side of the world, there are widows and orphans who fall on their knees in the dirt and bless our name to God. This is the highest blessing anyone can receive in life — to be blessed by the least of these.

I never could have imagined how much three little words would totally transform my world — we were wrong.
